WELCOME

Thank you for choosing to worship at St. E's today! St. Elizabeth's welcomes and affirms all of God's children. If the church can be of support to you, or if you are new and have questions about who we are, or about our worship style, please let us know.

How We Worship: Worship in the Anglican tradition invites us to engage our bodies, our minds, and our spirits. Sometimes we kneel or stand, other times we bow. It is often said in the Episcopal Church, "all may, some should, none must." At St. Elizabeth's, we follow the Christian year, which has for centuries been a way to seasonally organize our year around the life of Christ. The church year begins with Advent, a season of twenty-six days, as we await Jesus's birth at Christmas. After Christmas, we move into the season of Epiphany, where we celebrate Christ revealing himself to the world. After Epiphany, we move into Lent, where for forty days, we prepare for Christ's death which begins during Holy Week. Holy Week ends on Easter, when we celebrate Jesus's resurrection and power over death. After the fifty days of Easter, on Pentecost we remember the coming of the Holy Spirit who sustains us in our life with Christ. This is God sending us their divine presence that we might not ever be alone. Living into this Spirit is living into the life of Jesus. Pentecost is our longest season, and it continues until Advent. The first Sunday after the Feast of Pentecost is Trinity Sunday. All of these seasons are represented by various colors donned in our worship space, and in the clergy's stoles. At the start of every new church year, our scriptural cycle begins, as we follow a three-year cycle called the Common Lectionary. Following this schedule enables us to get through most parts of the bible.

New here? St. Elizabeth's is an Episcopal Church, part of the worldwide Anglican Communion. We practice worship in an



ancient and biblical way through common written prayer, fellowship, and liturgy. In a sense, this enables worship to be something that we all participate in. This way of worship also helps when our own words fail us; it enables us to feast regularly on the words of God; and it continually calls us back to the grace bestowed upon us, and all people, through the love of Jesus Christ. If you are new to St. Elizabeth's, we would love to hear from

COVID GUIDELINES

Due to recent guidance from the Diocese of Massachusetts, the CDC, and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the Vestry has approved the following updates to our Covid procedures which began on Sunday, April 3:

Facemasks: Facemasks are not required; however, they are recommended for when we sing together. Seating: Seating is open; two pews (rear of the left side) are reserved for socially distanced seating. Please only sit in those pews if you seek socially distanced seating. Communion around the Altar: When you come forward, please find a place around the altar to stand or kneel, and Communion will come to you. We ask that you continue to sanitize your hands before and after receiving Communion with the sanitizer found in your pew. In lieu of the common cup, individual cups from a common tray will be offered to all those who come forward for Communion. Individual cups should be deposited in the baskets provided as you return to your seat. Insomuch that Sudbury remains in the green-zone (which means the rate of COVID-19 infections is low), these guidelines will likely stay in effect for some time. Should data show an increase of cases, and our zone color changes to yellow or red, we will go back to our previous guidelines for worship which would include mandatory masking and socially distanced seating.

TAKING RESPONSIBILITY: By attending this service, I declare that...

- To the best of my knowledge: I/we have not experienced any symptoms of Covid-19 in the last 14 days. This includes fever, cough, shortness of breath, diarrhea, loss of taste/smell, or sore throat.
- Should I/we test positive for Covid-19, I agree I will contact church staff immediately.
- I understand that there may be people here who are unvaccinated; have tested positive for Covid-19; may test posi-• tive for Covid-19; or have recently traveled to higher risk places.

Episcopal Basics: When and how do we make a sign of the cross?

No matter how long you've been here, there may be some things in worship that are confusing, and often, they center around personal acts of reverence. What's comfortable to one person may be awkward to another. The point of personal reverence is to help you feel more connected to worship—engaging our spirits, our bodies, and our minds—and understanding why we do some of these things may help you decide what feels comfortable for you. The old Episcopal adage stands true: "*All may, some should, none must.*"

WHAT? Making the Sign of the Cross

WHY? To remember and reaffirm our baptism and the cross made on our foreheads.

HOW? Using generally the right hand, and either the thumb and index finger, or flat palm and middle finger, make a cross over one's body as follows, touching:

Forehead (Father), Chest (Son),

Left Shoulder & Right Shoulder (Holy Spirit), ending again at Chest.

WHEN? Here are some times during the liturgy where Christians cross themselves:

- The Opening Acclamation: "+Blessed be God..."
- The end of the Gloria: "+In the Glory of God the Father..."
- The end of the Nicene Creed: "+In the resurrection of the dead..."
- The **Prayers of the People**: when we pray for the departed+
- During the Absolution of Sin: when the priest makes the sign of the cross+
- During Eucharist at the Benedictus: "+Blessed is He who comes in the name ... "
- During the Eucharistic Prayer: when the priest says, "+Sanctify us also ... "
- After receiving communion +
- The Final Blessing: "And the +blessing of God Almighty... "

Another place where a different kind of cross is made is at the beginning of the **Gospel Acclamation** when the clergy say: "+*The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ....*" Here, one takes their right thumb tip and draws a small cross on their **forehead**, **lips**, and **heart**. This is a reminder to hear reverently the words of Jesus in our mind, on our lips, and in our heart."

I hope this is helpful to your understanding of our practices and tradition. Want to try?

And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live." But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him.

+Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints, including Frank, into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: by him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and forever. *AMEN*.

Celebrant The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your heart by faith, with thanksgiving. This communion is open to all who hunger for God.

When your row comes forward to the communion rail, please sanitize your hands.

To receive bread, hold out both hands, and the priest will place there a wafer saying: *"The body of Christ, the bread of heaven,"* to which the receiver says, *"Amen."*

To receive wine, the Eucharistic Minister will offer you a tray of individual cups, saying: "The blood of Christ, the cup of salvation," to which the receiver takes one and says, "Amen."

After receiving communion, many make a sign of the cross. Used cup can be placed in the baskets. If you prefer receiving a blessing in lieu of bread and wine, please cross your arms at the communion rail.

Where there is hatred, let us sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy.

Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love.

For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen.
